Combined fundraising by the state's 42 county party committees continues to be in a slump compared to four years ago, according to the latest reports filed with the New Jersey Election Law Enforcement Commission (ELEC).

"While Republican totals are higher than in 2009, overall numbers are lower than four years ago due to Democratic declines," said Jeff Brindle, ELEC's Executive Director.

For instance, county parties together raised \$5.3 million this year- down 28 percent from \$7.4 million in 2009. County parties combined have spent \$4.4 million- a drop of 30 percent from \$6.4 million four years ago.

"Republicans may be doing better than they were in 2009, but it still isn't easy raising money if you are a county party leader," said Brindle.

Despite the overall trend, Democrats still have an edge over Republicans.

"Democrats have raised and spent more money this year, and reported more cash reserves," Brindle said. "Republicans did report a higher net worth, which adjusts cash holdings for debts owed to or by the party."

"Several trends are responsible for this downward trend that started in the last decade. Initially, sharp reductions in county organization fundraising were pegged to pay-to-play laws. But the impact of the pay-to-play laws seems to have leveled off," Brindle said.

Brindle said the continued decrease in county party fundraising more recently has been "facilitated by the significant growth in independent spending in New Jersey elections."

"Independent spending has gotten so prevalent that these groups are turning into surrogates for the candidates, even to the point of attacking one another on behalf of the candidates," he said. "This year's election is turning into a modern version of "Lord of the Flies," he said.

While Republicans are lagging Democrats in overall fundraising, a Republican committee- the Burlington County Republican committee- has raised the most funds this year, spent the most money, and reported the highest net worth. Passaic County Democrats reported the largest cash-on-hand.
