Your letter dated March 17, 1978, to the New Jersey Election Law Enforcement Commission ("the Commission"), including a request for advisory opinion, has been forwarded to me for reply.

While the Commission does not render advisory opinions as to activities of a person in a position adverse to that of the person requesting the opinion, the Commission has noted your letter. Since the annual report to which you refer has not yet been completed and distributed, as we understand your letter, the Commission has no basis for further action at this time.

A number of factors are relevant in making the determination as to whether the publication and distribution of an official report is reportable as a campaign expenditure. These include whether the mailing or other material was sent during the active portion of the campaign; whether the letter is required to be sent or reasonably appropriate to be sent in carrying out the duties of the public office held by the candidate; whether the subject matter deals with the official duties of such candidate or with matters which properly should be brought to the attention of the public; whether the tone of the letter is the reporting of public information rather than being of a political nature; whether such letters are customarily sent by the candidate or other persons holding similar public office; whether it contains pictures, slogans or political material; whether the mailing or delivery is limited to the persons within the area affected by the public office, and the intent of the public official in sending such letter.

You may, if you feel that the annual report is a campaign expenditure, under the foregoing test, wish to file a formal complaint with the Commission. Additionally, the Commission would review any further information you may have regarding the annual report when it is completed and distributed.
