County party committees jointly raised \$7.6 million and spent \$8.7 million during 2010, according to quarterly reports filed with the New Jersey Election Law Enforcement Commission (ELEC). Together, they reported having \$1.2 million in the bank.

Democratic county party committees outraised and outspent Republicans, but had a smaller combined reserve after last year's elections. Some spending totals are higher than fundraising totals because committees have dipped into reserves, or taken out short-term loans.

Bergen County was the main statewide focus last year due to elections for the office of County Executive, a sheriff's seat and three freeholder seats. Fundraising and spending in Bergen County, the state's most populous county, topped all other counties. The two parties combined raised and spent \$1.7 million.

Compared to four years earlier, combined fundraising by all 42 county party committees was lower. However, while Democratic committees continued to raise more money than Republican committees in 2010, their overall receipts were down 50 percent since 2006. Fundraising by Republican committees was up 5 percent during the four-year period.

Jeff Brindle, ELEC's Executive Director, said a combination of factors has dampened the overall fundraising total.

"These include tighter restrictions on donations by contractors; the recession; the departure of former Democratic Gov. Jon Corzine, who gave heavily to county parties during the past decade; and the proliferation of political action committees (PACs) that compete for limited fundraising dollars," he said.

"All these factors have had the effect of depressing the amount of funds flowing into county party committees, particularly Democratic committees," he said.

Statewide, one Democratic county party committee- Passaic- had more than \$100,000 in reserve as of December 31, 2010. Four Democratic committees- Burlington, Gloucester, Hudson and Monmouth- were in the red.
